This issue of THE BULGE BUGLE contains an insert pertaining to the raising of funds for the erection of an Armored Forces Memorial at the entrance to Arlington National Cemetery, Arlington, VA. New Dates For VBOB Tour

Due to circumstances beyond our control, we are forced to postpone the VBOB Ardennes tour one week. Icelandair was unable to confirm the necessary number of seats for September 13 and 23 but was able to confirm for the new dates: September 20 departure, September 30 return. (September 19 departure from Orlando).

The planned itinerary will remain the same.

Icelandair has also raised its group fares, but there is sufficient cushion in our overall tour price to absorb that. We are charging all travellers the same air fare, which is the average of the fares from the various departure cities and with the raises stands at \$562. Since the APEX fares go down in late September, that makes a shift to the APEX most attractive for anyone wanting to stay over and return on his own: From New York, no additional charge; from BWI, \$50 additional; and from Orlando, \$100 additional. (For lack of travellers, we have had to cancel Chicago as a departure city.)

A memo dated 17 Feb 88 signed by Jody Davis, Chief Curator, Center of Military History, adds "the Ardennes Offensive 1944-1945" to the official mission statement of the Fort Meade Museum. The Battle of the Bulge Gallery is now a part of the Fort George G. Meade Museum!!

Enthusiasm and dedication marked the fourth meeting of the Battle of the Bulge Historical Committee held at Ft. Myer, VA on 27 February. Action was taken to incorporate and to hire an attorney to proceed in an orderly fashion with the development of fund-raising plans. Sandy Fauriol conducted a planning session during the last hour of the meeting to assist the committee in determining the goals they wish the Gallery to accomplish.

The Committee was especially honored to have as their guest Mr. Erle Cocke, Jr., National Commander of the American Legion 1950-51. Mr. Cocke is a highly decorated Infantry officer who served on B.G. Mc Auliffe's staff at Bastogne during the Battle of the Bulge. He was wounded three times and was actually "executed" by a German firing squad and delivered the coup de grace, but miraculously survived. Stories of such events serve to make the committee ever more aware of the importance of preserving the history of the Battle of the Bulge.

The next meeting will be a weekend retreat, March 26-27, when the Committee Members, Architect/Builder, Exhibit Designers and Director of Fund Raising will gather to develop over-all plans for the Gallery. The important decisions made at this conference will be shared with you in the next issue of THE BULGE BUGLE.

BY LAWS AMENDED INCREASING LIFE MEMBERSHIP DUES

Article VII A of the By Laws dealing with life membership dues was amended effective March 1, 1988. For age through 49, \$150; for age 50 through 69, \$125; age 70 and above,\$60.

These figures are based on life expectancy for the age group, a reasonable investment return, and complete diminuation of the corpus.

VBOB Member Honorary Colonel

In a ceremony in Berlin March 25th VBOB member General William A. Knowlton will become Honorary Colonel of the Regiment for the 40th Armor whose headquarters will be in Berlin. On graduating from West Point, Knowlton's first unit of assignment was the 40th Armored Regiment, 7th Armored Division.

The 40th later broke into the 40th Tank Battalion, the 709th Tank Battalion (which left the Division, but fought in the Bulge as a separate unit) and "E" Troop of the 87th Cavalry Recon. Squadron (Mechanized) of the 7th Armored. It was as an assault gun platoon leader that Knowlton fought across France in August 1944.

By the time of the Bulge, he was in Squadron HQ, but on New Year's Eve he took over what was left of "B" Troop, the majority of which had been cut off on the hill East of St. Vith. He remained with "B" Troop for the rest of the War and then moved to Berlin as Regimental Operations Officer and then Motor Bn. Commander.

Obituary

Reprinted From The Washington Times Monday, March 21, 1988

Gen. Bruce Clarke, saw combat in 2 wars

Retired Gen. Bruce G. Clarke, 86, commander-in-chief of the Army in Europe when Berlin was the focal point of the Cold War, died Thursday in Walter Reed Army Hospital after a stroke. He lived in McLean.

Although commissioned as an engineer officer, Gen. Clarke first gained military prominence as commander of Combat Command A, which joined the fighting in Europe in late 1943.

During some of the heaviest fighting in France in August 1944, he won the Distinguished Service Cross and three awards of the Silver Star in a 21-day period

During that month, Combat Command A captured several cities and bridges intact and liberated other cities, including Orleans.

His World War II combat experience were climaxed in Belgium in December 1944 at the beginning of the Battle of the Bulge. At the hamlet of St. Vith - a vital crossroads in the operation - regiments of the 106th Infantry Division were facing annihilation by overpowering German forces.

In a daring night move, Gen. Clarke led a combat command over frozen roads to open the first gaps in the German assault. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, in "Crusade in Europe," described the St. Vith action as a turning point in stemming the German tide.

Before leaving Europe for a highranking engineering post in the Philippines, Gen. Clarke served as assistant commander of the 7th Armored Division and commander of the 4th Armored Division.

He again saw combat in Korea. first while commanding the 1st Corps and later while commanding the 10th Corps. In 1954, he was named commanding general of the U.S. Army, Pacific.

From 1956 to 1958, Gen. Clarke commanded the 7th Army in West Germany. The 7th won the Silver Anvil Award of the American Public Relations Association for its work in improving German-American relations.

From 1958 to 1960, he was commander of the Continental U.S. Army, responsible for the ground defense of the Unied States

He returned to Europe in 1960 as commander-in-chief of the U.S. Army, Europe, and commander of NATO's Central Army Group. With Berlin the focal point of the Cold War at that point, the Soviet Union threatened the U.S. presence and erected the Berlin Wall. He retired from the dual post in 1962. Gen. Clarke was born in Adams,

N.Y., and graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1925. He later received a master's degree in civil engineering from Cornell University and a law degree from La Salle Extension University.

Gen. Clarke received three Distinguished Service Medals, three Bronze Stars, the Legion of Merit and the Air Medal, and Belgium's highest award for a non-Belgian.

Several of his many articles on training and command were published as Army pamphlets, and his book on commanding was translated for use by NATO forces.



BURIAL FLAG BENEFIT EXPLAINED BY VA

In 1987 the VA issued more than 350,000 American flags for burial or memorial purposes. The flags are used to drape the caskets of deceased veterans and are presented to the next of kin or close friend or associate of the deceased. Flags are issued at VA regional offices and most local post offices.

In recent years many VA cemeteries and other VA facilities have adopted an inovative way to honor the memory of those who served through the creation of an "Avenue of Flags" program.

Last year alone, over 4,000 flags which had been presented to families or friends of deceased veterans, were donated to the VA. When a flag is donated, a Certificate of Appreciation is presented to the donor and the flag becomes the property of the VA.

On roadways or along walkways at VA facilities throughout the country, standard burial flags are flown from uniformly spaced staffs. VA facilities which participate in the "Avenue of Flags" program erect the display on Veterans Day and Memorial Day. They may also do so on other days of patriotic observance such as Flag Day and Independence Day. If more flags are received than needed for display, a rotation system is used to insure they are all eventually flown.

VA's Department of Memorial Affairs administers the National Cemetery System comprising Ill national cemeteries in 38 states and Puerto Rico. Burial in a national cemetery with available grave space is open to all veterans discharged under conditions other than dishonorable, as well as eligible dependents of veterans.

Information on burial flags and other benefits is available by contacting the nearest VA office listed in the phone directory under U.S. Government.

VETERANS OF THE BATTLE OF THE BULGE PLAN MEMBERSHIP DRIVE

The Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge have launched a membership drive to double its 5,000 total by the end of 1988.

In announcing this campaign, VBOB's Vice President for Membership, Neil Thompson, recalled that the organization's objectives are to perpetuate the memory of the sacrifices involved, to preserve historical data and sites, to foster international peace and good will and to promote friendship.

VBOB is composed of veterans who fought in that six-week Ardennes Campaign in Belgium and Luxembourg in fog, snow, rain and ice in the bitter cold 1944-45 winter and of relatives, friends and history buffs.

The battle of the Bulge has been characterized by VBOB member and military author-historian Charles B. MacDonald, who fought there with the 2d Infantry Division, as the greatest battle ever fought by the U.S. Army. In addressing the House of Commons following that battle, Sir Winston Churchill said "This is undoubtedly the greatest battle of the war and will, I believe, be regarded as an ever-famous American victory."

Of the million participants in that battle, about 350,000 Americans survive.

VBOB sponsors trips to the battle-ground and plans to hold the 1988 General Membership Meeting there, conducts memorial and other ceremonies, publishes THE BULGE BUGLE, dedicated a plaque and a tree in Arlington National Cemetery, and is conducting a capital fund campaign to build an addition to the First U.S. Army and Fort Meade Museam.



(The above form is the one recommended to every veteran by VBOB to be completed now for use in advising survivors of the things they need to know in the event of the veteran's death. This form will save the family much time and anguish during a period of great stress and make concerned officials' jobs easier and more accurate when the time comes to claim any veterans benefits for eligible survivors.)

BATTLE OF BULGE REMEMBERED

...I still have nightmares on what I saw in Malmedy. I was with the 83rd Division from Normandy through the Bulge. I don't have to read "the Rise and Fall" either.

I don't write letters very much any more, but I would like to get permission to send the article to "The Bulge Bugle," our magazine. It is the official publication for veterans of the Battle of the Bulge.

On Dec. 10, 1944, I celebrated my 19th birthday, and on the 16th of December we were on our way to Duren. On the 17th we heard about the massacre. There were so many reports about the Germans behind our lines dressed in American uniforms that we were issued special cards for identification. I still have mine in a frame with my decorations. That card saved my life a couple of times. A few days later we were really in the thick of it and I got hit by an "American" tank. The concussion messed me up, and as I went through Malmedy I saw the frozen bodies.

As we get into the cold weather, my old bones seem to ache like they did in 1944. I have never been so cold in my life. Well, enough of my rambling about me. Let me say thanks for remembering.

The Last Salute

Joe Cavanaugh (442 Inf Reg, 106 Inf Div), of Bethesda, Md., 73, was buried on March 3, 1988, at Quantico (Va.) National Cemetery with full military honors following a ceremony at the funeral home in Washington, D.C. He is survived by his wife Carol, daughter Karen, and brother Bob.

At the funeral home, Monsignor William O'Donnell (346 Inf Reg, 87 Inf Div), VBOB Chaplain, conducted

the service at the request of the family.

He was followed by his brother who spoke of the family and other qualities of Joe, remarking that Joe had master's and doctoral degrees and was a demographer and population consultant having served with government and private agencies in Africa, Latin America, and the Pacific. He was a senior advisor to the United Nations and a member of a number of associations and societies.

Remarks, made by VBOB Founding President Clyde Boden (557th AAA Bn, 84 Inf Div), follow.

"Joe, the members of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge have been friends for just a few short years. But this is a good friendship, this is a strong friendship because it is based on the alchemy of battle—the greatest battle ever fought by the United States Army. We endured hardships during that bitter cold winter of 1944-45 in Belgium and Luxembourg, fighting in the fog, the snow, the ice, the rain, and the mud.

Joe, we will miss you.

You have been a faithful member of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge. You attended general membership meetings and executive council meetings and you participated in other functions and activities. You have been a major force for good.

Yes, Joe, we will miss you.

I am reminded of Psalm 46 which begins with "God is our refuge and strength." This is psalm of adoration that speaks of God's glory, of God's goodness, of God's majesty, of God's mercy, and of God's power. Jean Sibellius used the first two words of the tenth verse of Psalm 46 as the basis for "Finlandia" known as "Be Still, My Soul." Martin Luther was inspired by the seventh verse of Psalm 46 to compose a great hymn – Joe, someday we will join you in that "Mighty Fortress."

God bless you, Joe. God bless you. Amen and amen. "

Then, each VBOB member walked briskly to the casket, stood for a moment, saluted smartly, stood for a moment, and returned to his seat.

At Quantico the funeral procession proceeded to the burial area. Joe's pall bearers carried the flag-draped casket to its place of honor and all gathered around for the grave-site service conducted by Chaplain O'Donnell. As the services ended, rifles echoed from nearby and ''Taps'' sounded. Yes, we now had acknowledged Joe's ascension to the greatest of fortresses and we hand rendered our last salute.

As the strains of "Taps" edged toward the heavens, the words of that hauntingly beautiful bugle call came to mind:

Day is done, gone the sun, From the lake, from the hill, From the sky. All is well, safely rest. God is nigh.

Thanks and praise for our days, 'Neath the sun, 'neath the stars, 'neath the sky. As we go, this we know, God is nigh.

Farewell comrade, farewell.




