

44th ANNIVERSARY Commemorated

On 14, 15 and 16 December, 1988, over 140 Veterans of The Battle of the Bulge, their relatives and friends, gathered in the Washington, D.C. area to commemorate, with solemn ceremonies the joyful celebrataions, this important anniversary.

There were veterans from 14 states representing the lst, 2nd, 9th, 26th, 28th, 30th, 35th, 75th, 80th, 83rd, 84th, 87th, 94th and 106 Infantry Division; the 3d, 4th, 9th and 10th Armored Divisions and Engineer Combat Battalions, Field Artillery, Tank Destroyer, Field and Evacuations Hospitals, OSS and Mortar Battalion support units.

The three-day commemorations began with a "Dinner Gala" at the Ft. George G. Meade Officers' Club, hosted by the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation. Members of the Ft. Meade Reenactment Group (James Speraw, Commander) were on hand and dressed in WWII uniforms to meet and talk with the veterans.

The guests were greeted by members of the receiving line: LTC Alfred Shehab, Ret. (1st Vice President, Dorothy Davis, R.N., President, Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation; BG David Allen, Chief of Staff, First U.S. Army, and Mrs. Allen; His Excellency Herman and Mrs. Dehennin (Belgium); His Excellency Andre Philippe (Luxembourg); Lt. Gen. Harry W. O. Kinnard, 101st Airborne Division and Mrs. Kinnard; and the Honorable Thomas McMillen, Maryland House of Representatives.

In a colorful ceremony, the 519th MP Bn. posted the flags of the United States, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge. Col. Eugene Drouillard, Ret, 75th Division, led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance, followed by the invocation by Msgr. Wm. O'Donnell, 87th Division. LTC Alfred Shebab, Ret, 38th Cavalry Rec. Sq(M), served as the Master of Ceremonies.

A highlight of the evening was the receipt of a telegram from George C. Scott (the actor who played the role of Gen. George S. Patton in the movie "Patton," and a member of the Advisory Council of the Historical Foundation. The greetings read as follows: "On this, the eve of the 44th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge, I extend to the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation

and the veterans of that great battle my respect and good wishes. Further, my wishes for very warm Holiday Greetings to all of those involved in this most worthwhile endeavor."

After-dinner comments included special greetings by George Chekan, 9th Infantry Division, President of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, and BG David Allen. Emotional statements were made by the Ambassador of Belgium, Herman Deheninn and Ambassador Andre Philippe of Luxembourg both of whom were teenagers during The Bulge and offered their deep gratitude to the veterans and pledged their support to the Battle of the Bulge Gallery. Gen. Kinnard shared in the group several of his experiences of service if with Gen. McAuliffe's staff during those dark days in Bastogne.

The main event of the "Gala" was the unveiling of the impressive "Founder's 500" plaque that listed the 114 donors who had each contributed \$500 or more to the Gallery during the past 14 months. The plaque was designed by Col. Druoillard and William Tayman. Unveiling the plaque were

Sal Scarpello who served as a Sergeant with the 28th Infantry Division in Clarvaux and later in the Skyline Area where he was seriously wounded near the end of the battle.

Robert Hagel, 35th Inf. Div. near Harlange, Luxembourg. He and several of his buddies had been wounded and were pinned down by sniper fire; a Medic came to their aid and while tending to Bob's wounds, the Medic was shot through the Red Cross on his helmet. Bob dedicated his inscription on the plaque to "A Medic (name unknown) who died helping me."

Charles B. MacDonald, commander of a rifle company, 2nd Infantry Division on the north shoulder of the Bulge and who was also wounded during the last days of the battle. Charles is an historian with the Foundation and the author of a number of books including "A Time for Trumpets."

Ruth Puryear, R.N, served as an Army Nurse with the 107th Evacuation Hospital stationed from October to December 17, 1944 just four miles outside Bastogne. The 107th was the only Army Hospital located at the tip of the Bulge. As it became necessary, due to enemy action, to retreat from the (Continued on Page 4)

area it was through the dedicated efforts of the nurses and other personnel that they were able to bring out all of the wounded as they made the long, cold, treacherous trek back to Sedan, France. For these herioic actions the 107th Evacuation Hospital was awarded the Presidential Citation.

This historical plaque will be on exhibit in the lobby of the Ft. George G. Meade Museum until the Battle of the Bulge Gallery is completed where it will then be on permanent display.

The evening concluded with a stirring concert by the First U.S. Army Band under the direction of CWO Edward A. Greene.

Some 65 veterans attended the First Annual Open Meeting of the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation held in the Ft. Meade Museum. The meeting was chaired by the President, Dorothy Davis, R.N, 57th Field Hospital

After opening ceremonies, Clyde D. Boden, 557th AAA Bn, 84th Inf. Div. and founder of the Veterans of the Battle of the Buige seven years ago, spoke of the many accomplishments that have been achieved by this organization in that short time. VBOB now has an international membership of 6,000; has dedicated a tree and a monument in Arlington National Cemetery; visited the battlefields in Belgium and Luxembourg; chartered six chapters; publishes a newsletter - THE BULGE BUGLE; convenes General Membership Meetings and provides support for the construction of the Battle of the Bulge Gallery. Clyde concluded his presentation with the statement "The Gallery will serve as a legacy to memoralize and honor those who served in this great battle."

Sandie Fauriol, Campaign Manager, gave a report on the progress of the Fund Raising efforts. Many contacts have been developed and over \$70,000 has been contributed over the past 14 months. She concluded "Now that we have the essential tools - sketches of the exterior and interior of the museum gallery, Dave Pergrin's video, fact sheet and International Advisory Council list, we can begin meeting with corporations, foundations, and special individuals for major gifts.

Harry Wilbur, D&P Exhibit Design firm, discussed at length a most attractive sketch of a concept exhibit design for the Gallery.

A question-and-answer period was held. After the coffee break, Dave Pergrin, 29lst Engineer Combat Battalion, presented a most impressive and newly completed video tape "29lst Engineers in the Ardennes." Dave has graciously given permission for this tape to be used in fund-raising efforts for the Gallery.

The veterans and guests gathered at 1100 hours on December 16th at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Arlington National Cemetery, to witness the changing of the guard and the impressive special ceremonies performed by the Third Infantry (Old Guard) troops. With the Colors waving in the breeze, the U.S. Army Band playing and the precision marching of the troops, this is truly an unforgettable experience.

Col. Eugene Drouillard, Ret. (Vice President for Military Affairs and George Chekan, President, Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, placed a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. After the conclusion of this ceremony, the group moved to VBOB's plaque/monument near the amphitheater for the organization's remembrance events; George Chekan presided. William Greenville introduced the speaker, LtGen Harry W.O. Kinnard. Gen. Kinnard gave a short inspiring address, paying homage to the many who had given their lives in this battle. A wreath was placed at the VBOB monument by Mr. Greenville, 86th Chem. Mrtr. Bn and John Tuskan, 3d Armd Div, 36th Air. Elturino Loiacono, 10th Armd Div, placed flowers at the monument in the name of the 10th Division.

Taps was played by the U.S. Army Band Bugler. It was an emotional moment for all present.

SUBJECT: 1988 Campaign Summary

Happy holidays!

Our fund raising campaign is less than a year old, but we are well on our way to raising the \$1.5 million needed to establish the Battle of the Bulge Gallery. Below is a brief summary of our 1988 accomplishments.

- * Our solicitation to Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge members brought in more than \$40,000 in contributions; many of them were for \$500, adding the donor's name (or that of a loved one) to our Founder's 500 plaque.
- * We recruited a prestigious group of individuals to serve on our International Advisory Council. The list is enclosed; the names will be added to our revised letterhead soon. Many thanks to each one of you for supporting our museum effort in this way.
 - * Total 1988 gifts to the Foundation were \$70,000.
- * Our Summer and Fall mailings of a specially designed brochure to 19 unit associations for their annual meetings resulted in contributions and increased visibility about our project.
- * We met with a number of special people who pledged help in various ways during our September trip to Belgium and Luxembourg.
- * The cover story article about the Battle of the Bulge, featuring VBOB members Chuck Sweitzer, Eugene Drouillard, Elturino Loiacono, Robert Phillips, Clyde Boden (and me) that appeared in the December, 1988 issue of <u>Soldiers</u> will be helpful in our fund raising efforts.
- * We have asked for a major contribution from the Disabled American Veterans; our request for support is pending.

Kinnard, Colonel Anthony Holtry, Mrs. George Chekan, Mrs. David Allen, Mrs. Harry Kinnard and George Chekan--at the gala dinner commemorating the 44th anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge at Ft. Meade on December 14.
- * The Founder's 500 fund plaque, containing the names of 114 donors, was unveiled by Robert Hagel, Charles MacDonald, Ruth Puryear, R.N., and Sal Scarpello at the December 14 dinner.
- * Another highlight of the evening was a telegram of good wishes for the museum project received by International Advisory Council member George C.
- * The Foundation's first annual meeting was held on December 15 at the Fort Meade museum. Harry Wilbur unveiled a beautifully rendered sketch of an exhibit design for the Battle of the Bulge Gallery that can be used for fund raising purposes.
- * We formed a Development (fund raising) Committee consisting of Dave Pergrin (Chair), Bill Tayman and Bob Phillips in addition to Sandie Fauriol and myself.

December 16, 1989 is the 45th anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. We expect to make significant progress during the coming year, and look forward to counting on your continuing support and interest in our Battle of the Bulge museum project.

Pastor's Corner

War and Remembrance. . .

This past September I made a 10-day pilgrimage back to Belgium and Luxembourg to revisit the scenes for the last German offensive of World War II. Popularly known as the Battle of the Bulge, it was Hitler's last great desperate grasp at seizing victory from the jaws of defeat. There were about 140 of us on the journey representing many of the units that fought in the battle. As is often the case in such pilgrimages, it was a time of reflection and reevaluation.

One cannot help but wonder about the attraction to return to the battlefields of years gone by. Yet it was a fascinating experience. For many of us it was the opportunity to grasp the "big picture" for the first time—to realize the magnitude of the battle and yet view it on a personal basis.

The battle itself lasted from December 16, 1944 until late in January 1945. Approximately 600,000 Americans were involved in the fighting. Of that number 81,000 were casualties, over 15,000 were taken prisoners and 19,000 were killed. The Germans had at least 100,000 casualties. Two American regiments were forced to surrender almost in their entirety. It was a bleak experience for those involved and a depressing Christmas holiday for those at home.

The tide turned and victory was ours. Heroes emerged. General McAuliffe's response to a German demand that he surrender his force at Bastogne was, "Nuts." The 4th Armored Division's dash into Bastogne to break the siege caught the headlines. General Patton's bombastic proclamations of sure victory stirred the imagination. These leaders and many oth-

ers were the architects of victory. But it was average G.I.s fighting on the ground under deplorable conditions who won the battles. This is what we learned forty years afterward.

As we toured the battle sites, and there were many, we began to appreciate that the attack was doomed to failure almost as soon as it began. This was due to the tenacity and ingenuity of thousands of young Americans operating oftentimes in small groups who kept delaying the German master-plan by blowing up bridges in their face, holding key points when they should have been overwhelmed, and demonstrating their ability to think and act on their own. Even the two unfortunate regiments who were cut off and forced to surrender managed to hold out long enough to upset the Germans' timetable to a substantial

It was the opportunity to grasp the "big picture"

degree. Nothing will bring back the thousands of young men who sacrificed their lives and the many others who were severely and permanently wounded. But it had to be done and they did it. Not every American was a hero or even measured up to the demands made upon him. Fortunately, most did, and there were more than enough to make the difference.

The Ardennes section of Belgium where most of the fighting took place 40 years ago still maintains the dark and melancholy atmosphere with which we are familiar. It is also a warm and beautiful area. The simple farms and small towns have in many cases become weekend and summer homes for the affluent city dwellers of Belgium. Many of the landmarks are no longer there, but the events of the battle are etched in the memory of the local residents. Above all the naturally warm and generous spirit of the people expresses their friendship and appreciation for the sacrifice made by many young Americans in defense of their freedom. Their love and affection for the United States is most

Was the pilgrimage worth it? You bet. It is good to recall again those special qualities that represent the American spirit. That we, indeed, have the strength, courage and resourcefulness to meet the challenges that beset us as a nation.





Rules Reviewed For Donating Artifacts to The Bulge Gallery

All systems are "GO" as the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation continues to get closer step-by-step to an acceptable design for the Battle of the Bulge Gallery, U.S. Army Museum, Fort George G. Meade, MD.

Many veterans have artifacts, memorabilia and documents or personal articles that could help tell the story of this great battle and should be ear-marked for future donation to the Battle of the Bulge Gallery.

In this issue of THE BULGE BUGLE (page 7) is a form entitled" Artifact Information Request which you may complete and mail to the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation, P.O. Box 2516, Kensington, MD 20895-0818

Examples of artifacts that could enhance the Gallery are items of uniforms and equipment that have some Bulge-related historical significance; weapons; documents to include letters, official papers, and unit histories; unit and action photographs containing, to the extent possible, names and other specifics; maps, stories and books about the Battle of the Bulge.

It must be emphasized that no materials should be sent to the Battle of the Bulge Historical Foundation or the Fort Meade Museum at this time.

There are several important points. One is that the procedure for logging in items and documents is a lengthy and time-consuming process — an item as small as a button must go through the same procedures as a machine gun. The other is that once the donated material is accepted it becomes the property of the U.S. Army and cannot be returned.

It is important that veterans store, in protective containers, the materials each would be willing to donate to the Gallery. At the proper time, a request will be made for certain items and postage-free containers will be provided.

The "Artifact Information Form" serves two purposes: (1) Provides a record of artifacts, documents and materials that each veteran would be willing to donate, and (2) Informs the Exhibit Design Firm of available materials that could be incorporated into the display design and greatly enhance the effectiveness of the Gallery.

The Battle of the Bulge Gallery will be the only one of its kind in the United States and will be an eternal legacy which the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge leave to future generations as a personal record of the greatest battle every fought by the U.S. Army.

This legacy will be as impressive as the living and honored veterans make it. Give this matter your serious consideration NOW and mail in the form at your earliest convenience ...and perhaps enclose a financial contribution along with the form...it would be greatly appreciated.

Are Your Dues DUE?

CRIBA

The following was contained in a speech made by Noel J. Mormont in Mondorf at the banquet on the last night of VBOB's tour in Luxembourg on 29 September 1988. Noel is a member of CRIBA, Center of Research and Information on the Battle of the Ardennes, and shows admiration, respect and gratitude which the people of Belgium and Luxembourg have for the veterans who fought in the Battle of the Bulge.

"CRIBA is a non-profit association founded eight years ago by a few Belgians who were interested in the Battle of the Bulge. The objectives of the CRIBA are practically the same as those of the VBOB: To perpetuate the memory, to preserve historical data and sites, to foster international peace, and to promote the friendship among the survivors of the Battle and the Belgian population.

"The first time you came over, our country was occupied by uninvited visitors. They did not willingly agree to leave the place. You had to kick them back to where they belonged.

"It was a success until your advance came to a standstill because of over-extended communications lines. You had to settle on defensive positions. Then, on the most unexpected part of the front, at the most unexpected time of the year, with the most unexpected military power, the enemy hit hard. You took the blow. By your courage, gallantry and stamina, you defeated the evil plans of Mr. Hitler.

"And thus you became our liberators for the second time. Belgium still remembers that you put an end to Nazism and that we owe you our freedon.

"Whenever any of you told a Belgian 'I was here during the battle,' smiles, shake hands, kisses, thanks, all the signs of friendship arose spontaneously. Forty-four years after the battle, this friendship shows you that your fight was right; it shows that those who gave their lives remain forever with us in the huge cemeteries of La Neuville, Henri-Chapelle and Luxembourg and have not given their most precious possession in vain.

"War is evil, as said a friend of mine, but let's thank The Lord that it gave us the occasion to find friendship in the hearts of men."

Dee Paris, one of the first members of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge, provided the information for this very fine article.

Effective 1 May, VA EDITOR'S will add four valor awards and the Purple Heart to inscription information on future headstones and markers at no charge. These are in addition to the inscription "Medal of Honor" and a facsimile of that medal. The additional awards to be inscribat Government expense are the Distinguished Service Medal, Navy Cross, Air Force Cross and Silver Star. Headstones and grave markers are provided by the VA without charge for gravesites of veterans interred in any private, state veterans or National cemetery.

Battle Of The Bulge Video

In September, 1988, a television crew from The Chesapeake Media Institute accompanied some 100 VBOB members on a return tour of the Ardennes region of Luxembourg and Belgium. The tour was organized by Charles MacDonald, author of A Time For Trumpets who, along with VBOB president Bill Greenville, had been working with CMI on the creation of DECEMBER DAWN: A 90-minute PBS documentary on the Battle of the Bulge.

The production effort begun on this tour will culminate next summer with the national and international release of this very special television project. Unlike earlier film projects on the Battle of the Bulge, DECEMBER DAWN will tell this story from the perspective of those who lived it— GIs, medics, field nurses, gun and tank crews—veterans like yourself recalling harrowing memories that you all share.

In furtherance of its constitutional policy, the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge (VBOB) encourages tours of, and visits to the Bulge area. VBOB will not endorse any tour nor will it approve any tour publications or announcements indicating VBOB approval or endorsement nor will it permit the use of its emblem (logotype) in the advertising. announcements or promotion of these visits unless approved in advance by VBOB.

Brief notices about tours may be published in THE BULGE BUGLE provided they are received before the copy deadline for publication and provided the notices inform interested readers how and where they may obtain complete information needed to participate in the tour. VBOB will have the final authority on the decision to publish.

Travel firms and individuals who are conducting a visit to the Bulge area are invited to submit, as soon as possible, the tour dates, the area to be visited, any special events and activities, the costs and supplemental costs and the name, address and telephone number of the person or firm who will furnish complete information and registration forms to those who are interested. VBOB EXECUTIVE COUNCIL MEETS MONTHLY

Much of the policy-making and decision making and other business of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge is accomplished between General Membership Meetings by the Executive Council at Fort Myer, VA on the third Saturday of each month. The council is composed of elected and appointed VBOB officials.



Widows of veterans rated 100% for service-connected disabilities who die from other than service-connected causes, may, if in receipt of compensation for ten or more years prior to death, are entitled to receive DIC benefits regardless of the cause of death provided they were married two or more years or that a child was born of the marriage.

Former POW's not rated as service- connected disabled by VA are entitled to VA hospital and nursing home care without regard to ability to pay. They are also eligible for outpatient care on a priority basis second only to service-connected disabled veterans. While receiving treatment, these veterans are eligible for needed medicine, glasses, hearing aids and prostheses. If POW internment lasted 181 days or more, needed dental care is available.

A 5 minute tape will give a short presentation to veterans groups and a 30 minute tape will provide a more detailed story of the battle and VBOB.

Educational benefits are also offered to the spouse and children of a POW or a soldier listed as missing in action.

VBOB MEMBERSHIP DISTRIBUTION



Records indicate 5,050 VBOB members reside (some are deceased) in the U.S. as of an unspecified date. Five thousand thirty-nine are distributed throughout the 50 states. We are trying to locate the ll who are residing elsewhere in the states. Can you help us locate them?

The map shows the number of members who listed their address in each state. The greatest VBOB state population is 632 in Pennsylvania which furnished the 28th Infantry Division of the Pennsylvania National Guard. Next door, New York lists 457 VBOB'ers, Florida claims 304. Seven states show 200/299 and five states list between 100 and 199. So 3,889 (77%) VBOB members live in 15 states. Alaska has two and Hawaii has three.

Seventy-seven percent (3,865) of VBOB members live East and 23% (1,185) live West of the Mississippi River. Approximately 24% of our members live South of the Mason-Dixon Line (extended).
